Dear Larry:



DOCTORS BAG

Syphilis. It's an ugly disease. Its ability to rayage the body with hideous lesions and monsterous sores that engulf human flesh is well known. Untreated, it transforms the human body into a mountain of decayed

"raw meat" on legs.

But that's just half of the story. The other horror of syphilis is the attitude of the societies in which it appears. There is treatment for syphilis, for those with the courage to acknowledge the presence of the infection. However, the historical record shows time and time again that the social stigma the disease would generate proved to be the disease's greatest ally in spreading its agonies. Syphilis was considered "evil." It was something "good people" didn't get.


And if they did, it was more proper to "suffer in silence" for your "sins" than seek needed help.

The disease itself became inseparable from the additional miseries created by the societies in which it occurred. We shall examine both aspects during the next eight installments of this column.

To modern medical science, the definition and symptoms of syphilis are quite obvious. It's easily recognized. Yet history records no existence of any syphilis-type disease until just about 500 years ago. What "created" it? Where did it "come from"? Was it always present, but unnoticed? For nearly half a millennium, scholors and medical historians have debated the mysterious origin of syphilis.


Those debating the issue are divided into two schools of thought.

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
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Either syphilis originated in the New World (Columbian Theory) or had always been present in the Old World from time immemorial (Pre-Columbian Theory).

The New World followers believe the syphilitic infection was native to Haiti. It was then carried from Haiti to Europe by Columbus' crew when they returned to Spain following his second voyage. Columbus departed Seville in August, 1492, and following his visit to Haiti, he returned to Palos Bay on March 15, 1493.

Accompanied by six sailors and six Indians, he traveled from Palos to Barcelona by way of Seville. This group of travelers, plus the sailors who remained at Palos, are believed to be the disease carriers who caused the syphillization of all of Europe. And ultimately, the world.

Scholars adhering to the Old World theory affirm just as vehemently that syphilis had been present in Europe prior to the voyage of Columbus

but was either unrecognized, confused with other diseases (leprosy), or was present in a much, much milder form.

Whatever its origin, there was no question that a great epidemic of syphilis suddenly appeared in all parts of Europe, and by 1497, had spread as far as Scotland.

It is obvious that neither theory of the origin of syphilis is entirely satisfactory. Not only is it difficult to conceive how such a major disease could spread so rapidly from a single port of entry, but it is equally difficult to accept the conclusion that a previously "tame" disease could so suddenly produce the severe symptoms of syphilis and become epidemic.

But nevertheless, the "new" disease was a reality and it began to startle physicans and the populus alike. Their writings in the 1500s reflect intrigue, shock and horror. We'll examine some of those early written records in the next installment.

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
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
