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
#### SAMPLING TEXAS


It was of fleeting and seasonal solace. Suicide, similarly.


Many times in an hour he hung by his neck and got down again. He concluded



#### ANSWERS BY ADAM

Dear Adam,

I know that the State of Texas does not sanction gay marriages. But with the gaining strength of the gay liberation movement, are there any signs that this could change? What legal approaches could be taken if someone wanted to fight those anti-gay laws? My lover and I are very happy together and feel that we have a right to have our union recognized by both the church and the state.

Dear Robert.

Admittedly, the gay liberation movement in Texas is, indeed, picking up great momentum, especially in Houston. But although many authorities have established a "hands off" policy toward gays and harassment is diminishing, the gay marriage concept is still a long way from reality in Texas and other states. Those "good ole boys" that comprise the Texas legislature are, for the most part, outraged by the very idea of such associations. If this matter is to be decided favorably, it will come from the somewhat more liberal courts and not the legislature. But even in the courts, it's still pretty shaky ground. However, some headway is being made in other parts of the country by fighting the issue on constitutional grounds.

According to the American Civil Liberties Union, the consitutional arguments most commonly used are that the refusal to grant gay marriages is a violation of the First Amendment right to freedom of association, an invasion of privacy as protected by the Fourth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments, and a denial of due process and equal

protection of the laws as guaranteed by the Fifth and Fourth Amendments.

The First Amendment generally protects the rights of individuals to associate with one another. No right to marry or to engage in sexual relations has, however, yet been recognized by the Supreme Court to be protected by the First Amendment.

The right of privacy has been more clearly defined by the Supreme Court to quarantee freedom from unwarranted government interference in what has been styled as the individual's zone of privacy. Matters so personal and intimate as decisions whether to use contraceptives or not, or whether to have an abortion or not, have been protected under this Amendment, Similarly, the decision of two people to marry and to choose with whom they wish to have consensual sex and an intimate relationship should be protected against needless government interference.

The Supreme Court has recognized that the right to marry is a fundamental right in cases of interracial marriages. The denial of such a right to one group (gays) while allowing others (persons of different races) may be said to deny equal protection of the laws unless a substantial reason may be shown for the difference in treatment.

The Supreme Court has held that discrimination on the basis of sex may violate the equal-protection clause. Since refusal of a marriage license because the partners are of the same gender may be argued to be a distinction on the basis of sex, and because the right to marry is a fundamental right, the court must examine the social interests of society allegedly served by such a refusal, and determine whether those interests outweigh individual interests.

The reasons commonly given to

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

justify the refusal to sanction gay marriages are (1) that the government should try to "cure" homosexuals and not encourage home homosexuality by tolerating and legalizing it; (2) that issuing a marriage license would place states in the position of officially sanctioning a relationship that may encourage the commission of illegal acts such as sodomy; (3) that most Americans view marriage as a union between a man and a woman who can consummate a marriage by heterosexual intercourse, and almost the same number believe homosexuality to be morally reprehensible.

Many responses to these arguments are possible. First, the American Psychiatric Association has concluded that homosexuals are not "sick" and need not be "cured." In any event, prevailing medical opinion has long been that

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it is almost impossible to change sexual orientation. Second, the laws that prohibit consensual sexual acts in private between adults are arguably unconstitutional. Further, in all states except Kansas, New York and Pennsylvania, many sexual acts are prohibited, even if they are committed by married heterosexuals. Moreover, there are various sexual acts that may be performed by gays in private that are not proscribed by statute.

Finally, the Bill of Rights was intended, in part, to protect minorities against discriminatory treatment imposed by reason of a majority's deeply held beliefs. Many Americans believed that interracial marriages were immoral, but the courts have nonetheless held unequivocally that such marriages may not be prohibited. Society's moral preferences, whether based in religion or not, should not permit the denial of a fundamental right.



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
