# DISCOTECHNIQUE

Was it enough that Monty Rock III managed to camp and carry on to millions of ears via the national airwaves? It should warrant some kind of a Grammy from gay people, for he has done his part for our liberation.

But we have more than that to thank him for. Monti Rock III's *Disco Tex and the Sex-O-Lettes Revue* album was responsible for a major part of the disco revolution in the music industry.

Aside from being simply a good album, it had a magic about it, a flair and a conceptual genius that overshadows most all of the output of major artists in the past half-decade. It was wicked. It's a mastery of showmanship, the burlesque and bizarre, song and dance. It had balls.

Moody Blues, Grand Funk, the Rolling Stones, et al.

For a while, song and dance as a dual artistic concept seemed almost forgotten. Deluged by Meistersingers with something to say, whether about war and famine, hard days and straight sex, or politics and religion, we made do with poets.

It was a vanilla rock and roll, however worldly. And it was a music ill-designed for dancing — and so lacking at that. One does not dance well and hard at acid rock. So there.

Something was missing in the music coming out of Hollywood, New York, Nashville and London, whether it sold well or not.

Lo, enter Monti Rock III, the obscure and done-well-to-have tried-to-forgotten, who exhorts us, and get

this, to get dancing! Listen to this faggots, he's too much.

We did. He was. The album was an undisguised smash.

The key to his magic, and the predominant theme of *Revue*, is audience participation. We feel like a part of the show, for we can hear us shouting and celebrating, camping and carrying on, going crazy. That's hot.

It makes you want to dance since according to your senses you already are. It makes you feel trashy, since according to the lyrics everybody is.


And read this: it makes you feel like liking feeling trashy. Now, that's fun.

In some way, Monti Rock (Sir, the third, if you will) has controlled us. It's no secret (or is it?) that when a public is generally demoralized, its tastes take a turn toward the exotic, if not its morals a turn for the worse. Miss Rock is, if anything, exotic; hinting as he does, at something less than morals. Viet Nam, Watergate, the recession — I can name any number of reasons why the American Public felt demoralized in the past two years. Small wonder that people have stopped listening to entertainers reminding them of their problems. None love the messenger who bringeth bad news.

"It's that time!" sings/screams
Disco Tex, jubilantly.

It is the collective trauma of a public conscience that gives the entertainment industry its audience. And a true entertainer — whether a comedian, a singer, or a lovemake on a screen — does his job in capturing at least momentarily the attentions and the minds of his audience; creating, in a word, diversions.

Well, fine. They've done it. Little continued on page 18



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# **SCREEN SHOP**

Like its print and stage predecessor, the film version of *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* is a dirty, filthy film. But not in a style to which we have become accustomed. Of sex and words there is little to offend the sensibilities of the American hipster. But it is to the U.S. chic that this cinematic effort will most offend the sensibilities.

The film is not a product that offends the viewer. It merely reflects the society in which we exist — and shows us for what we, as a society, have become. Offensive. For those prone to predict doom will come the realization that the tragedy of our existence has already reached that point. A plastic, oppressive culture repugnant to the heritage we so commonly tout in public.

As you probably already know, the action of the film is centered in a ward for the mentally ill. But as you might also suspect, the question of whether it is the animal or the zoo keeper that is really meritous of being caged is not moot. Despite our modern day efforts to force such questions to a comfortable hidden position, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* forces attention on such thoughts and reveals that in the game of society there are winners and losers — and for the most part, we are all losers.

The mantle of performance worn by Jack Nicholson is not unlike that garnered by Cliff Robertson in his Oscar-winning role in *Charley*, a film whose overall general message is closely akin to that of *Cukoo's Nest*.

But where *Charley* left the viewer with a gentle, wrist-slap indictment of the folly of our society, *One Flew Over the Cukoo's Nest* is not so kind. And rightfully so.

Audience reaction to this Christ-mas-present release film comes in direct proportion to the political and social attitudes of those viewing. Little will be the variance of appreciation based on standard cinematic judgement criteria. The film stands almost flawless. So opinion falls not in the nature of presentation, but in response to the message once perceived.

Most leave the film on one of three moods. There are those who are little moved by the film's message. Those in that catagory would include the John Wayne-Susie Sororiety types who just can't believe there is really anything wrong with our Henry Kissinger-Gulf Oil-Sara Lee society. Secondly, confirmation of all the ills of our society

they have suspected all along. And finally, and most visibly shaken, will be those individuals who once thought all was well with our society, but are just now beginning to become shaken by the fradulant premises on which it is built.

Don't get me wrong. This is not a continued on page 18

politically dogmatic theme under discussion. To the contrary, it is a deeply moving personal story of a group of society's outcasts and the effect of one man who wouldn't conform. But it is played against a background that requires affiliation to a specific pessimistic view of our inhuman efforts in being a society. And the greatest personal appreciation of the film comes to those with the ability to percieve the disgustingly true nature of our collective existence.

This film makes you view with a little more compassion all those stories of people giving up their worldly belongings to go sit out on a mountain and wait to be rescued by aliens from another planet in a UFO. They may just be smarter than any of us left behind. Even if the UFO never comes!
