The Screen Shop

Christopher Savitch reviews Barry Lyndon

Barry Lyndon stars Ryan O'Neal. And that's that. That is all that can intelligently be revealed between a person who has seen it and a person who has not. Things like plot, characterization, tempo, etc., have been put captivatingly into a capsule in Barry Lyndon — a capsule that each viewer must unwrap and take in his or her own way. Like the movie 2001: A Space Odyssey, it's something you have to experience for yourself. It just can't be dismantled artistically in a few short paragraphs.

But why shouldn't it be that way both films are the product of that one-man mental factory called Stanley Kubrick. And indeed, it is the Kubrick name that is filling the theaters, not that of vehicle or stars. And those that do go are generally not disappointed. Those who come to view the bizarre visions of Kubrick are treated to a heaping helpin' of same. Conversely, those unknowing persons expecting your basic "shoot 'em up" usually depart the theater in disgust prior to the conclusion of the four hour epic. In fact, if you don't like your seat during the first half, there are usually a lot more to pick from after intermis-

But perhaps that is how it should be. Barry Lydon makes no attempt whatso-ever to please all the people all the time. Kubrick does not acknowledge the existence of the common denominator. But for those who do find it fulfilling and pleasing, it is fulfulling and pleasing in a spectacular way.

The photography of the visual vingettes demonstrates a mastery of techniques that were unknown prior to the shooting of this film. (By the way, Barry Lyndon was completed more than two years ago, but the studio has had it sitting on the shelf gathering dust, waiting for the most opportune time to

formless, but flawless. Like a fine painting, the film draws appreciation greater than the total appreciation of all its parts — and all that in a mood of unreality. It's the kind of film that makes you sit up and take notice, or catch a quick snooze. No middle ground. Love or hate.

The film also carries a high interest factor because of the definitive authenticity of the historical period recreated by Kubrick. We know, for a fact, that Kubrick is presenting, in vivid detail, the "way of life" as it was 200 years ago. (If you are interested in the old custom of dueling, this film is a must.) But while we know we are getting a fair representation of the "facts," the facts, like everything else in the film, is tainted with Kubrick's "vision." So you suddenly find yourself knowing all the "facts," but at the same time, not knowing anything at all. And if all this sounds confusing, I can only refer you back to my comments in the first paragraph of this epic text.

But as one final word of encouragement, this film will be a "cult" film to those whose interest lies not only in film, per se, but film photography. Ditto that person who enjoys any kind of photography. It's a photographer's film. But also, it's a film for music and sound score buffs. Many times the visionary thread with which Kubrick weaves his spell *Barry Lyndon* is not visual, but one of sound — a sound that seems to bypass the ear and go right for the gut. But in a nice way of course.

So there you have it, *Barry Lyndon*. Impossible to describe with justice. A film that makes no promises. But a film that also delivers great joy for those for whom it was intended. Take your chances.

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
