

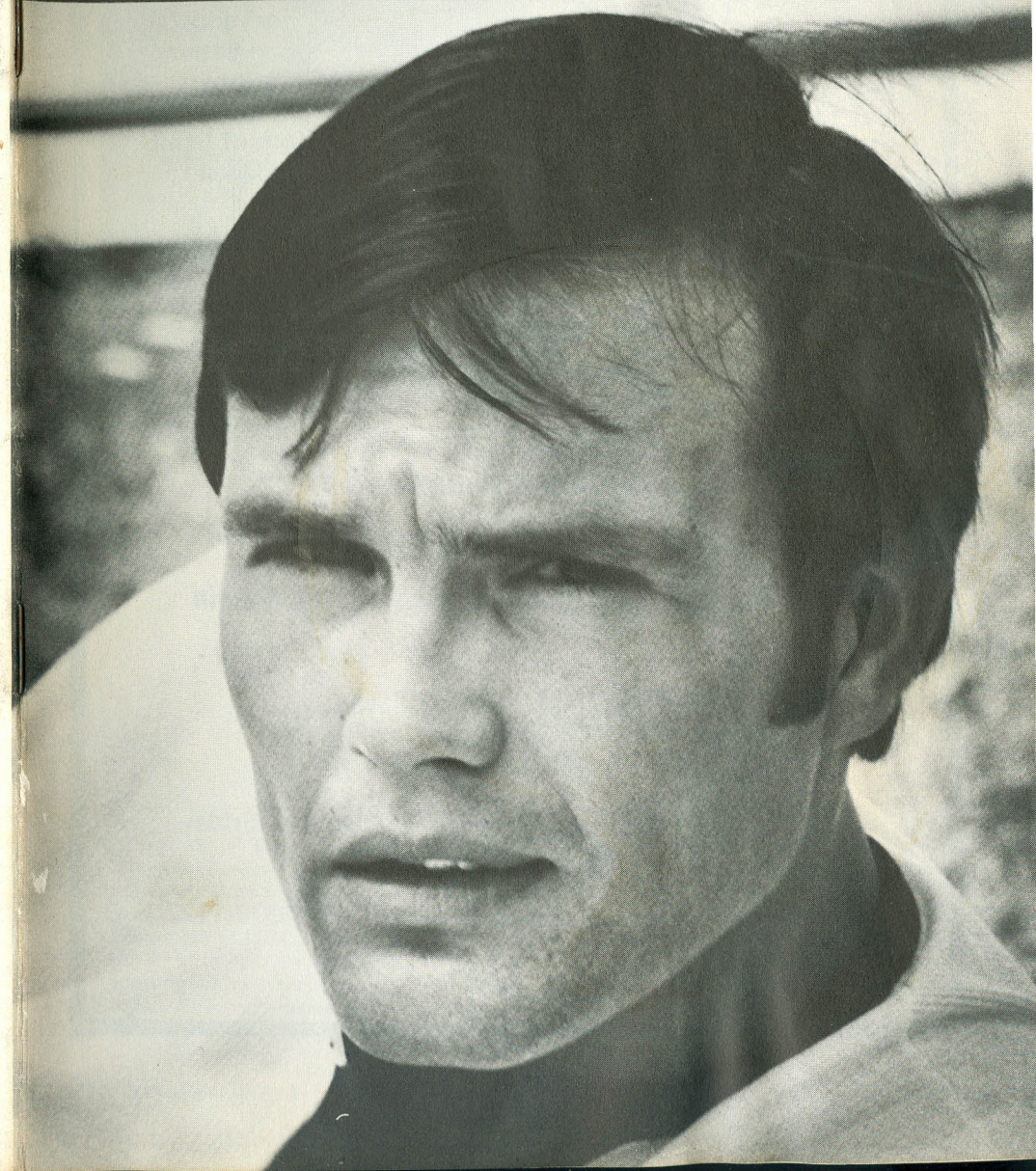

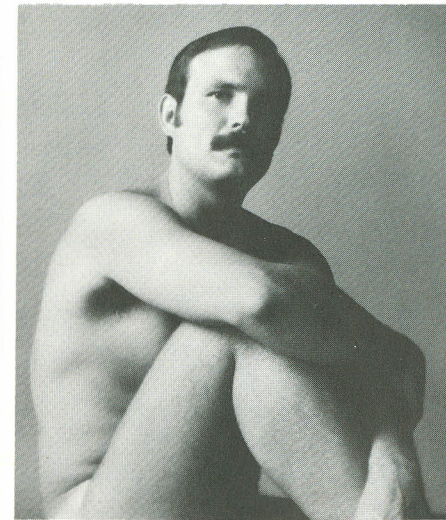

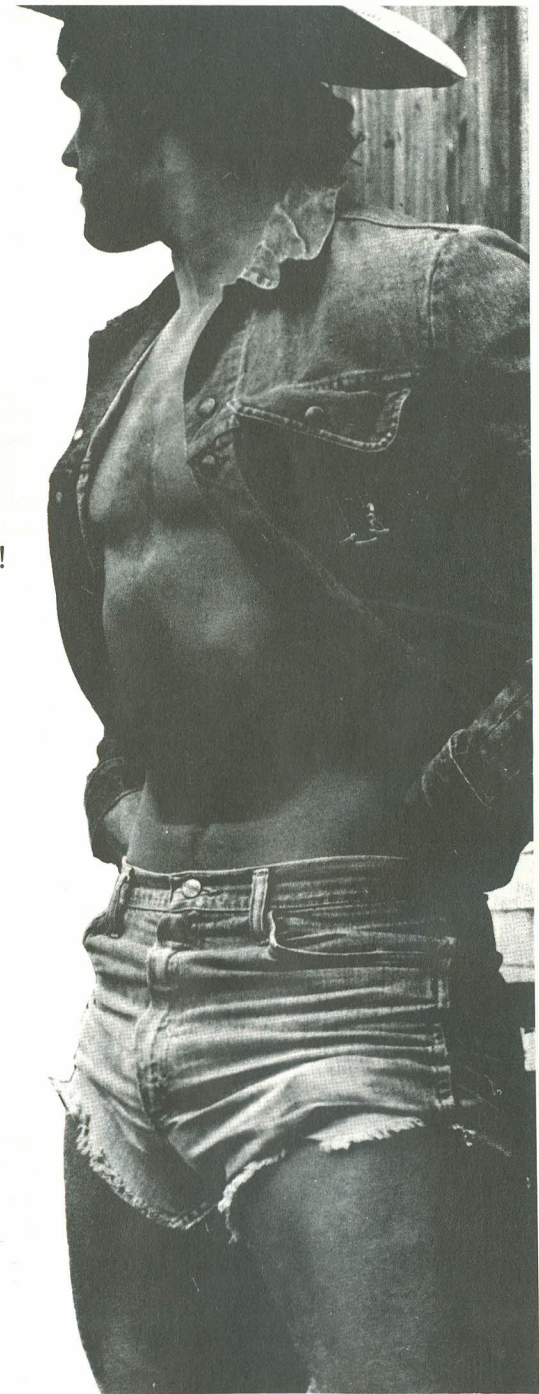

Christopher Savitch reviews *The Texas Chain Saw Massacre*

I like trashy films. I admit it. Just as some people have a secret fondness for "junk" food, I have been known, on several occasions, to sneak away from my friends and lounge in the glow of a really wretched "junk" flick. It's not the sort of activity you brag about, or recommend to others, it's just one of those things that some people have hang-ups about. I am one of those people. The worst kind.

Yes friends, that was the "hang-up" that placed yours truly in the theater awaiting a heavy dose of *The Texas Chain Saw Massacre*. The advertisements on TV, by their crudeness, had me pre-convinced that this must be the winner of the "Annual God-Awful Sweepstakes." Additionally, I did have some curiosity concerning the film because I knew it had been made by a group of young film makers in Austin on a budget equivalent to the amount of money required to produce the first half of a 10-second Alpo commercial. This film, I had to see.

Well, where do I begin?

Obviously you suspect there was something about *The Texas Chain Saw Massacre* that set it apart from other "junk" films or I wouldn't be discussing it. You are correct. To say that the film is different does not do it justice, however. It's more than that. It's a first-rate "pussy slapper," as they say. This film jumps off the screen and starts playing with your head before you have time to decide if you want your head played with or not. I thought I had seen

every kind of junk film ever made, but I had *never* seen anything like this. Without doubt, *The Texas Chain Saw Massacre* was the most horrifying film I have ever seen. It even puts *professional* films like *The Exorcist* and *Jaws* to shame, on the terror scale. And I'm sure those dozen or so people who left the

theater during the first third of the film will agree. I expected the film to be trashy. It was. I expected the film to have lots of gore. It did. I expected to be mildly entertained. I wasn't. I was *petrified!* If you can deposit all your convictions concerning "proper" film

making at the door, and for two hours just be satisfied to relax in shock, this film is just for you.

Analytically, the film works because it has that one quality that most horror junk films lack — suspense. Oh sure, they all have one or two good moments that hold your attention, but the stuff in between is usually a bore. *TCSM* is not that way at all. For the entire length of the film, you watch from the edge of your seat, breathing as softly as your heart will permit. Remember how scary it was as Anthony Perkins prepared to take a knife to Janet Leigh in the shower during the movie *Psycho*? *The Texas Chain Saw Massacre* holds you in that same state of expectant terror. And more. For two hours.

And finally, for those who think they are too "hip" to be really scared by a motion picture, you need also be advised that the story on which the movie is based is true. You don't have the luxury of just sitting back and reminding yourself that it's "just a movie." It is just a movie — but a movie that shows what really did happen to a group of five young people. True, the movie does embellish the action, but the action did really occur. (And it doesn't take much embellishment on the part of the film maker to convince me that hanging a live girl from a meat hook must have been horrible — and that's one of the tamer sequences in the film.)

The Texas Chain Saw Massacre makes no attempt to enlighten you. Or make you more sophisticated. Or intellectualize. It only attempts to scare the hell out of the audience. And with that as its prime goal, it is a smashing success. More than a movie, it's a nightmare of your very own. Get me to the iron lung.

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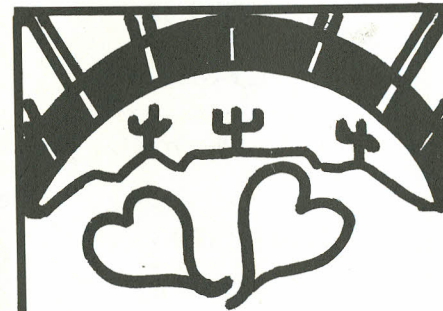
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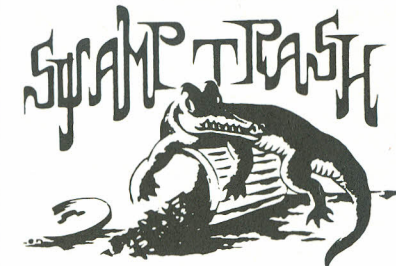
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
