
Fourthly, the Briar Patch has a new manager, Ralphie, and a new night bartender, Paul Taylor. Welcome aboard. Choo-choo!



The group began with the gold-hooded gods of Egypt, followed by Mary's own Jim Farmer elaborately costumed as the High Priest of Egypt.

Behind him were musicians, dancers and maidens throwing flowers.

Cleopatra's offering to the judges was a human sacrifice . . . a hunky dude whose body glistened in silver. He was of course carried on a silver tray by six slaves as he fed grapes to the crowd.

Mark Anthony came next, followed by Cleopatra herself! Thousands of New Orleans visitors begged for pictures of the magnificient headdress, gown and the goddess of Egypt. Words cannot descibe the splendor and beauty of it all.


There were film crews from some leading news organizations (including CBS) that caught Cleopatra and her group for their audiences.
