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

Another benefit for Mary Jo Risher is in the works at the Olive Branch May 16.


And we've already mentioned the new Old Plantation is soon scheduled to throw open its doors.



So there you have it. Pick your event. And start your engines. See ya next week.











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


"But you're moving out of the Montrose. Out of the center of activity." Burt reasoned.

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
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## **Gay News Briefs**

#### SAN ANTONIO CONFERENCE HELD DESPITE CONTROVERSY by Hugh Crell

The title of the nation's only officially sanctioned gay bicentennial program, "Gay in San Antonio — a Sense of Belonging?" proved to be the compelling question as conference coordinators battled the combined forces of local politicians, media and anti-ERA forces.

More than 400 participants corssed a picket line to attend.

Operating under a \$5000 grant from the American Issues Forum, the two-day program featured as speakers state representative Elain Noble of Mass., the nation's first open-homosexual elected to high office; Karen De Crow, president of the National Organization for Women; and Del Martin, co-founder of the Daughters of Bilitis.

Conference coordinators Bettie Naylor and Kathy Deitsch found themselves without a site two weeks before the event following a blitz of incendiary media coverage.

One local newspaper conducted a "poll" of its readers on the desirability of the conference and a radio announcer urged listeners to phone the Oak Hills Motel, the original site. The motel

received a barrage of negative calls, including bomb threats, and reconsidered its welcome.

The San Antonio Light reported the cancellation with two-inch-high headlines shrieking "Gay visitors tossed out."

Naylor and Deitsch filed an FCC challenge against the announcer and the station's license.

The conference was finally held at an aged, former public school-turned-community-college on the city's east side.

It is ironic that while the controversy centered on the propriety of using federal funds to promote a gay-oriented program, the protests forced the site from a private motel to a center funded 50% by the city of San Antonio.

Del Martin of San Francisco presented a Friday evening program on the struggle in the 1950s on the west coast. As she recounted gay people crossing pickets to attend the first public costume ball in San Francisco, listeners were unaware they would face the same experience the next day.

Police were summoned Saturday to disperse a small group of protestors carrying signs reading "Gay — No Way," "If I'm Straight, Gays Must Be Warped," and "San Antonio Doesn't Need Gays." There were no confrontations.



Falls, Pastor Phone (713) 526-8233 The morning program featured a panel of mental health, social service, religious and political leaders. They discussed gay/non-gay relationships with the concensus that the relationship is tenuous, at best, and that the fault lies with both communities. It was felt that gays have done too little to educate the larger community.

De Crow received a standing ovation from the early afternoon audience with an address linking the feminist and gay rights movements. Her struggle, she emphasized, is not to promote the rights of women but to work toward a society in which gender is immaterial to how one chooses to live one's life.

She pointed out that straight men face even more severe sex roles than women, but, because society rewards those roles disproportionatly, they have less incentive to reject them. De Crow said that if gays fail to perceive their struggle for equality in the larger context of gay/non-gay sex role stereotyping, they have little chance of achieving their goal.

Elaine Noble proved to be the most popular speaker with a presentation titled, "The Future of Gay Belonging."

She attributed her election as a representative to the Massachusetts House neither to the liberalism in Boston or to a gay vote. Massachusetts is erroneously cast as a liberal state, she noted, because it voted for McGovern in 1972. "Actually it's very conservative," she noted, "but because of our long history of political corruption, we're more adept at recognizing crooks."

Stressing that she is not a single issue

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politician, Noble pointed out that she was elected by a coalition of gays, blacks and senior citizens. She has lost the support of gays who do not support her on non-gay issues but states that she does not want single issue support.

She views gay rights as part of a struggle of people ranging from Iowa farmers to Boston blacks to secure the rights guaranteed in the Constitution.

To her, the route to success lies in building cross-cultural coalitions of people far whom the system does not work.

She recalled an episode in her campaign when a drunk approached her and said, "If you get elected, every broad, nigger and queer will want in."


She turned to him, smiled, and said, "That's right."


The conference closed with a feeling that the gay community does indeed have a sense of belonging, but that if it is unwilling to assert itself and work in cooperation with other minorities, that sense will not be translated into reality.

Dr. Bruce Voeller, executive director of the National Gay Task Force; and Jean O'Leary, NGTF legislative coordinator, were also in attendance. They had flown in from New Orleans where they had successfully secured a U.S. Job Corps agreement not to discriminate against gays.

### TEXAS A&M GROUP FIGHTS FOR RECOGNITION

A group of gay men and women at Texas A&M University have applied for university recognition under the name





"Gay Student Services Organization."
The group submitted a statement of purposes and application for recognition on April 5, 1976, to Dr. Carolyn Adair, director of student activities, as required by University regulations.

The organization stated in its application that its major purpose would be to serve the university community. The primary means of fulfilling this purpose would be the operation of a referral service for professional counseling. The organization also plans to provide information concerning gay life through a speakers bureau staffed by its members.

Despite several assurances from a high-ranking university administrator that a reply, would soon be forthcoming, the organization says it had received no answer.

Bobbie Nelson, the Austin attorney who represented the plaintiff in a similar case at the University of Texas in 1974, has been advising GSSO. Due to what GSSO views as delay tactics, rejection of the application is anticipated, in which case the organization says it will file a suit.

### LESBIAN SINGER TO PERFORM IN TEXAS by Pokey Anderson

Meg Christian, a nationally-acclaimed lesbian singer, will be giving women's concerts in four Texas cities May 7-16.

Her music ranges from the hilarious "Ode to a Gym Teacher" to the romantic "Joanna" and she is known for delighting her audiences wherever she



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goes. Her first album, produced by the only all-women's recording company in the nation, Olivia Records, has already sold out of several press runs.

Her first concert was to be in San Antonio on Friday, May 8, followed by Austin on Saturday, May 8. More information can be obtained by calling 655-3724 in San Antonio or 472-2785 in Austin.

She is scheduled to be in Houston on Thursday, May 13, sponsored by Pointblank Times. Tickets are available at Just Marion and Lynn's, Ursula's, the Lamp Post and Odd's Place.

Christian is then scheduled to go to Dallas for a beneift concert for lesbian mother Mary Jo Risher at the Olive Branch Saloon, Sunday, May 16.

Two years ago, a north Texas fundraiser featured a football game between the Ft. Worth Flaming Faggots and the Dallas Diesel Dykes. (Noting the tie score, writer Rob Shivers proudly



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announced, "The women won, six to six.")
