REVIEWS

Theatre

It was closing night of the New Texas Theatre's Stories for Americans and we couldn't help but regret that such a fine production received so little publicity from the media. Those of us who complain about the lack of professional theatre in Houston should go to the trouble of seeking out such an organization as the New Texas Theatre in lieu of the syrupy, overproduced alternatives around town.

Housed in an alarmingly handsome building on Lamar, NTT's proscenium stage is large enough to enhance ensemble works, but not so enormous as to lose the subtlety of smaller, less conspicuous productions. Its cathedral-like ceiling makes for hollow, well sounding acoustics. The lighting is carefully designed and engaging. The stage itself seems somewhat dwarfed by the long cavernous room; and yet, all the intimacy of the action remains intact.

Stories for Americans was the most un-bicentennial bicentennial production we have yet to experience. Devised by Nancy Brooks and Alfred Hyslop, the "stories" were a collection of myths and fables from around the world; stories whose characters included monkeys, trees, snakes, spiders, even God Himself. These characters were presented under Hyslop's careful scrutiny and woven into a series of most unusual and interesting tales. Strictly G-Rated, Stories for Americans was a musical fantasy that deserved more than the usual low key attendance.

We anxiously await NTT's next production, "The Queen and the Rebels" which opens Friday, July 23, 8:30 p.m., also directed by Hyslop. If Stories is any indication of what we may expect from NTT, then perhaps Houston Theatre is finally going to advance beyond the monotonous stalemate which seems, at present, to enclose it.

INSIDE OUTSIDE COUNTRYSIDE



"Oh. Yeah."


"When are you going to call him and tell him?"

I looked down wearily at the re-






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
