




## FELLER PRESENTS DISCUSSION


Katy Feller, president of the Gay Activists Alliance of Houston presented a panel discussion on gay students' needs at the Universities Housing Officers conference last Wednesday.


with myths (stereotypes) surrounding gays, and hopes, with the proper education of basically homophobic students, to dispell these wrong interpretations of gay lifestyles.

#### DALLAS/HOUSTON SWITCH OFF


The customers of the Old Plantation Show Bars in Dallas and Houston are in for a real treat this Sunday as the shows



"How can I tell. You've got the worst handwriting I've ever seen!"


"Don't blame me. I lost my mascara pencil. All I could find to take notes with was a lipstick."


RADIATION. What? "JOE!" Bubba hollered. GOVERNMENT AREA.


The sun was somewhat higher in the sky. Joe was nowhere to be found. The herons had left. Bubba was alone.

#### **Theatre**

If you can imagine a play that has everything: comedy, drama, political intrigue, slapstick, philosophy, religion . . . oh yes! And love (we mustn't forget love), then perhaps you can imagine The Marriage of Mr. Mississippi, presently running at Main Street Theatre. Autrey House. Indeed. Mississippi has everything. So much of everything, in fact, that you just might get bored halfway through the performance. Written by Friedrich Durrenmatt (and translated by Michael Bullock), the script can be as outrageously funny as it is wordy and redundant. The plot is complicated, at times muddy: Florestan Mississippi, a ruthless prosecuting attorney, pays a visit to the beautiful and recently widowed Anastasia in hopes of getting her to confess to the poisoning of her late husband. She admits securing the poison in order to put her sickly dog out of its misery, but will say no more until Mississippi pressures her into a passionate confession. (At one point he comments, "You, madam, are an abyss of emotion.") Her husband's welldeserved fate, she declares, has come about due to his illicit affair with another woman. That other woman, we discover, is the wife of Mississippi, whom he has taken upon himself (in accordance with the law of Moses, he says) to likewise poison. They decide to marry, as punishment ot each other for their hideous crimes. So far, so good.

But then the plot slips into heavy melodrama with the introduction of other political and religious figures that do little more than walk around commiserating while Mississippi's marriage hits the pits. (Anastasia's own philanderings don't help matters any.) And at the end of a treacherously long first act, we found ourselves wondering whether to stay past intermission, or go home and catch the rest of Mary Hartman Mary Hartman on Channel 26.

John Goodwin (who also plays Count Bodo) has directed this piece with style and precision. The subtler comic moments are by far the best. Becky Bonar, as the cool Anastasia, is a very funny comedienne and makes the most use of Durrenmatt's witty commentaries on love and death. Even David Dickerson as the oilv Mississippi brough more life to his role than we expected. But except for a delightful respite by Donna Yeager as the confused Lucretia, the other actors (Carl Bays, Ira Black, Steven Ortego, Robert Vitray, and Tony Wick) seemed to overplay their roles. Perhaps this was how director Goodwin intended to keep us awake during Durrenmatt's excessive comic philosophy. by Tom Goreman

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

"Don't."


