




NEW FROM WACO

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


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"GAY" - A LINGUISTIC HISTORY

Plato stated his position very clearly: "Great armies should be composed of homosexuals." In the great thinker's opinion, straight men were "too effeminate, not very dependable, not especially courageous, given to decadence, and required a cumbersome camp-following contingent that hampered effective maneuverability." He felt quite comfortable that anyone reading his discourse on armies would see the obvious truth of his relative estimation of gay and straight men.

Alexander the Great, using Plato's formula, had conquered the world by age 33.

Lord Nelson also felt that gay men were preferred stock for the British Admiralty. Since the most popular form of conscription in Nelson's day was carrying the drunk on board ship and sailing before they sobered up, frequenting water front gay bars was especially hazardous for our brothers living in that era.

Winston Churchill in an address before Parliament as First Lord of the Admiralty said: "The three great traditions of the British Admiralty are: rum, sodomy, and the lash."

If the above statements seem a little strange to you, it is because modern societies have strange ideas about the nature of homosexual preference. Until shortly before the turn of this century the word ''homosexual'' conjured images of a masculine cult of usually military people. In other fields of endeavor, homosexual behavior was also popular.

Our gay sisters do not now have the popular image they had in classic times. Sappho's image has survived revisionist history. She was an outspoken and courageous woman, but there is no indication that she had any reservations about her womanhood. Through much of history the popular image of lesbians was that of women who exalted the characteristics of independent womanhood: sophisticated, urbane and literate, but not masculine, male hating or violent.

So where did we go wrong? Where did we get the nelly queer/butch dyke image we now have? The great shift in the popular image of homosexuals



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occurred in the 1890-1910 era, only about two generations ago. The most significant event of that era involving homosexuals was the Oscar Wilde trials. The fighting between Oscar Wilde and the Marquis of Oueensbury were media events in the tabloid magazines then popular, something like the Watergate hearings were media events on modern television. The impact on the public mind was significant enough to change stereotypes drastically. In a short period of time male homosexuals came to be though of as being Oscar Wilde duplicates: sophisticated, rich, decadent, effeminate, fancy, witty and intellectual. Two generations later, as we came out, each of us tried (with varying degrees of success) to conform to that image.

I think it is interesting that the word "gay" came to be associated with the homosexual sub-culture at the same time. In London during the 1880's the term "Gay Society" was roughly equivalent to "Cafe Society" or our modern "Jet Set": the rich, socially active, beautiful people of that era. Thus the "Gay 90's" referred to the dominance of the upper class in the news of the day. Poor, unsophisticated Americans were not familiar with the British vernacular, but they read the tabloid magazines. When Oscar Wilde was described as a member of the Gay Society, Americans did not know exactly what that meant. But the stories said he was a homosexual so Americans assumed (by mistake) that "Gay Society" was synonymous with "homosexual cult." We started using the word "gay" in place of the word "homosexual," and exported the notion to the rest of the English speaking world during WW I and WW II.

The word "gay" and the nelly image of male homosexuality have grown together in this society, and by way of contrast, the butch image of

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our assumed opposities (male heterosexuals and female homosexuals) has grown at the same time.

American tourists are frequently surprised at how nelly the average European straight male is. Many gay Americans have had to learn that the macho symbols used on this side of the Atlantic to indicate straightness are not of much value over there.

It seems like that the regimented masculinity of American males is an acted out, culturally imposed variation of our puritanical/frontier society. Today's non-gay males are acting out the roles historically and traditionally reserved for our gay brothers living one hundred years ago. Of course, one hopes that our gay ancestors were less violently masculine than the macho straight types around today. It is embarrassing that masculinity has come to be associated

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with the violent, unfeeling, uncaring, selfish trip that simple personalities feel they must conform to. By pushing maleness to its unnatural extreme. macho has given manhood a bad name. The kind of sick macho found in the police syndrome means that one must be a MAN at the expense of being human.

Ideally we should live in a culture where there are no put-downs of those who fall anywhere along the butch/ fem spectrum. It is simply cultural propaganda that makes one think that being homosexual requires one to act in a certain way, while being heterosexual requires something else. The differences between gay and non-gay women and men exist only in popular misconception and mythology and has been shown to change from one period of history to another. And this period, indeed, is one of the blackest.

Perhaps knowing the historical background of the word gay, and putting it into your personal perspective, will help you to be free to be your natural selves.

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

Sandra Scoppettone's first novel, Trying Hard To Hear You, is an unpretentious little book that successfully manages to probe the mind of an eccentric teenage girl through her first encounter with homosexuality. It's written in the first person singular of that character and never tries to exceed its own boundaries by making too heavy a comment on love or homophobic prejudice. She simply tells it like it is

The main character of the book is a disgruntled, awkward young lady named Camilla Crawford who has some very definite opinions about life. But don't expect her to be hilariously weird like Pookie Adams or have the biting wit of Daisy Clover. You'll be disappointed. Camilla is . . . just Camilla

Her story is set in a small New England seaside town and deals with the reactions of a close-knit group of high school kids who discover that two male members of their gang are "queer for each other." Scoppettone touches lightly on this unsuccessful love affair but spends most of the book resolving Camilla's own feelings on the subject of homosexuality. It seems that her best friend, Jeff, is in love with her steady date, Phil, and the two of them are discovered one night kissing behind some bushes at a party.

This discovery naturally results in total repulsion and alienation from all the other kids in the group; and Camilla's feelings are predictably exploited for the reader's personal enlightenment on the subject. But somehow, and we're not exactly certain why, the story works. Not beautifully. Or poetically. But nonetheless, it works.

From a rather long, sketchy beginning, to a mildly entertaining climax, Trying Hard To Hear You is an admirable first attempt at a fond remembrance of a high school summer many of us had the painful occasion to experience.

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

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



