

"I don't know what you're talking about."



course I do favors. Cheerful Assistance is my middle name. Pull my chain. Ring my bell. Toss my salad. I'm yours!"


"How would you like to do some work today?" Burt asked.




SUNDRY SCHOOL

.... With Dignity

Now that summer is almost over, we feel that it is time to bring all of you up to date on the activities of Dignity/Houston.

You may remember that Dignity was at one time a regular advertiser and supporter of TWIT, but our ad has been conspicuously missing from it's pages lately. We were never sure how many of you saw our ad or even understood what Dignity was. We never had any delusions about attracting the masses (activism has never been appealing to the majority and religion even less so), but hoped to reach out to a few more of you than we originally had.

In May the Parish Council of St. Anne's Church asked us to leave the premises. It was their mistaken notion that our presence at the church had spawned the creation of a gay bar (practically on their front doorstep), and had caused aged men to go beserk and expose themselves to their children after school ("Lord, what fools these mortals be!!") But what they failed to acknowledge was the fact that St. Annes parish includes the majority of the largest gay community in the Southwest.

So! From St. Anne's we moved to St. Basil's Byzantine Rite Church on West Main. We stayed there for 6 weeks before the Board of Directors of St. Thomas University told us to move

on. It seems the Parish Council of St. Annes felt it was their Christian duty to inform the Board of the evil lurking within their own boundaries. (St. Thomas owns the land St. Basil's occupies).

It was at this point we requested a meeting with Bishop Markovski of the Galveston/Houston Diocese. He was unwilling to meet with us but we did get in to see his assistant, the Chancellor. We informed him of our difficulties with the Catholic community, and of our immediate need for a meeting place. We had two very productive discussions with Chancellor Fiorenze, and he is now pleading our case before the Bishop. Hopefully, the Good Lord will intervene on our behalf and we will soon have a new meeting place.

That is all the news to date. Dignity/Houston is still living and growing, but we are now meeting in private houses throughout Houston. I would like to take this opportunity to invite anyone who is interested, or even mildly curious, to attend one of our meetings. 

POKEY ENTERS RACE

GPC co-founder Linda (Pokey) Anderson has entered the race for Montrose/Fourth Ward Neighborhood Development Commissioner with a list of luminary endorsements including those of incumbent Commissioner Dr. Milton Lower, Houston Area NOW Chapter President Betty Barnes, Joe Villareal of the Coalition for Barriar-Free Living, Gertrude Barnstone, and a majority of precinct judges within the district. Neighborhood Commissioners are the administrators of federal funds targeted for older neighbors and the Montrose/Fourth Ward allocation for 1977 is \$750,000. Anderson believes the money should be used to restore rather than replace older structures in the area.

She was prevailed upon to run as a write-in candidate when Democrat nominee Betty Graham White shocked





supporters by endorsing Dolph Briscoe's hand-picked conservative, Calvin Guest, for State Democrat Chairperson, Incumbent Commissioner Lower says, "I began asking around for a good candidate and the name that kept coming up was Pokev Anderson."

Among her other accomplishments, Anderson is the sparkplug of the local Sexuality and Lesbianism Task Forse of NOW, a co-founder of lesbian/feminist monthly Pointblank Times, and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the National Gay Task Force. When asked why a gay should enter the race, she replies "Gay people helped convert Montrose from a slum to one of the most desirable neighborhoods in Houston. Gay people deserve a voice in its future."

The Amazon Studio is reportedly up and 'coming'. Reports have been most favorable. Give them a try: they're a very friendly bunch over there.



(Hollywood) - - Who is probably the man responsible for producing more hit records than any other in the history of American music? His name is Bob Crewe. In the 60's he created dozens of hits for the Four Seasons, Mitch Ryder & the Detroit Wheels, and scores of others . . . as well as creating the Bob Crewe Generation . . . who turned the music from a TV commercial into a number one instrumental called "Music To Watch Girls By".

Always at least two steps ahead of "contempory music", Bob's more recent credits include co-writing La-Belle's "Lady Marmalade", and creating Disco-Tex & the Sex-O-Lettes, and their super songs "Get Dancing" and "I Wanna Dance Wit' Choo". Even though his association with that aggregation has ended, his string of hits has not. He put together Frankie Valli's "Swearin' To God". He co-wrote and produced "Hollywood Hot" and all of the other cuts on the Eleventh Hour album. Getting up early and staying out late, he went on to create the biggest disco smash of 1976 so far -"Street Talk".

Now, after months of work, the album "Street Talk Suite" is complete, and should be released this month. Lunching in the coffee shop of the Beverly Wilshire Hotel, Bob played the "Suite" on a cassette recorder he usually carries with him. Even though the hostess constantly came around asking us to "please turn it down", the supreme quality of the LP was always evident.

"Street Talk" is a boy who comes to Los Angeles and hustles his way into an incredible array of sexual and social situations.

*(Inspired by a Praline Lady he met in New Orleans years ago . . .) The highlight of the "Suite" is Bob Crewe singing the lead - - for the first time - - on a ballad called "Time For You and Me", that will be released as a single even before the album comes out. LuAnn Simms, Bob's associate, and a lead vocalist on the first "Disco-Tex" album, confided that though this is his first "up front" vocal, he's almost always demonstrated to the "stars" the way he wanted the lead and back-up singing sung.

Bob Crewe is responsible for the sale of millions of records, even though (according to another reliable source) he doesn't read a note of "written music". Respect is due to his many collaborators: Denny Randell, Kenny Nolan, Cindy Bullens, and others... but the genius of the man is unmistakable. Bob Crewe has overseen a decade of American music.

Next time, another record producer who has come out with a great album on his own . . . Giorgio . . . one of the Knights in White Satin, and the man who made Donna Summer a disco star.


But then Tommy, contrary to his good looks, remained generally unpopular throughout most of his college years and was not able to attract the looser, more forward coeds. His

Tommy looked at him curiously. "If you're th-that unhappy, m-m-maybe you should I-leave."



REVIEWS

OH COWARD

One must first realize that OH COWARD! is **not** a play. There is no plot, no 3-dimensional characters, and only a page or so of sketchy dialogue woven intermittently into the fastpaced musical revue. (We dislike calling it a revue because of the connotation the word regrettably implies: that of gaudy theatrics strung loosely together with no particular meaning or message. And OH COWARD! says something. It's a witty and very personal commentary on theatre, travel, love, family life, and women joined tightly together by some very pleasing tunes with some very funny lyrics.)

But it's a difficult show to stage. And to have the production come off with all Noel Coward's biting satire requires nothing less than a structured, professional ensemble. For Houston's Country Playhouse (Town and Country Village) to tackle such a piece is ambitious, certainly, but perhaps how shall we say it: something of a lark?

Jerry Scales has directed the show with much vigor. His characters move well, and parade stylishly about the

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stage as one would expect participants in such an ensemble piece to do. Betty Dickenson's choreography was admirable, and would have brought more polish to the show had any of the actors been able to dance. Or even keep time with the music. But they couldnt. They shuffled about like residents at a senior citizens dance or a home for declining paraplegics (at times their shuffling was even louder than the music). And for that reason, coupled with their combined voices that never quite molded together, the evening's best moments remained exclusively with solos and duets.

The script originally calls for only two performers, but Scales (at the request of the CP board) was obliged to use three different couples. And some of them were painfully weak. Such as Marty Fleck, who seemed out of breath before the first ensemble number had hardly begun. And Bettye Gardner, whose "operatic" voice quivered incessantly when it occasionally managed to ring out over the shuffling feet. Lois Fleck was cute (even charming) in a couple of places but couldn't carry a tune in a jock strap. Director Scales realized this and wisely assigned her to the faster, talkier songs, David Grant had a pretty face. Dallas Purdy seemed less confident than we remembered her in last year's hypnotic Promenade (Main Street Theatre) but brought more of the needed professionalism to the stage than the other actresses. And last, though certainly not least. Kenneth Allen Newman presented a dynamic portrayal to his role that left us . . . oh, Goreman, why be coy? He was hot! He sang well, he moved well, and he looked good. What more can we say?

Conceptively, OH COWARD! is an amazingly slick piece of entertain-

ment. And CP's production, despite some of the performers, was (after a rather slow start) effectively tantalizing. But it's a 30-minute drive from Montrose to the Country Playhouse. And tickets are \$4 (You can get a seat at the Alley for \$3). So without meaning to slight the effort (and we saw a great deal of effort put into the production) we recommend it only to those who might be consumed with the weekend blahs and desire an unconventionally amusing respite in local theatricality.


