In addition to the show and the prizes for military attire, there will be a 40's dance contest, and disco music after the show.


So, be warned, on October 23, Levi's turns into a World War II Combat Zone!




The snake moved toward a paper bag sitting nearby on the floor.

"Three thousand dollars should do it."


"THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS" "I won't be comin' back!"

"No, I mean it. And it doesn't bother me the way you talk. I think it's kinda cute."





From there they walked over to the Museum of Fine Arts and through the great monolithic entranceway that dumped them smack-dab in the middle of several large domeish exhibits.


For the first time since Bernard had known him, Tommy became mildly animated and began to talk about the



Back on the Starship

At first I thought that after Heart's debut set before lefferson Starship's recent appearance at Houston's Summit I could have gone home completely satisfied: musically and emotionally, intellectually and erotically. And I could have. But I don't intend to diminish the power and intensity of Starship '76 (more later about getting back on the Starship).

Heart is a new band out of Vancouver led by two sisters: Ann and Nancie Wilson. Female rock and roll has come of age, and it's about time. The sexual intensity of Ann's upfront vocalizations and Nancie's acoustic guitar combine to create one of those new syntheses in music that make you feel instantly that their music is both contempory and capable of creating new levels of self-awareness in the listener: Music at its best.

Take, for example, Heart's "Magic Man" with the magic hands. Or their "Crazy on You," where Ann sings about the desperation of a stifled love that can never have an outlet, even though she pleads so convincingly with

all her strength: at the Summit, she sang to that man wherever he may be, even if he is that unobtainable idol in the "pages of a magazine."


As a new band in their first national tour, Heart established itself as the hottest act to catch next time around, especially if music for you is a kind of shorthand of emotion.

But then there was Starship with their statement . . .

The most exciting aspect of hearing and seeing Starship '76 was feeling a re-awakening in their music of that dream many of us had (and have subsequently lost) during the era of the Airplane's 1967 tour (when Grace Slick left the stage in tears because their Houston performance was so badly performed and received).

The best of the Starship's latest efforts (Spitfire and Red Octopus) tell us very subtly that the dream is not dead (as in "Yankee Doodle keep it up") as long as we "Ride the Tiger" (their opening number) and hang on to that dream through the turmoil of the 70's.

Getting back on the Starship is a returning to that dream with a new



commitment to those much-maligned "hippie" ideals about Peace and Love as the means to solve the world's problems. Starship music has evolved with the times, not remained in the acidrock days. But their statement no longer bears the idyllic unreality of the Woodstock era — their statement is now more pragmatic, their music as contemporary as ever, and their professionalism in keeping with the price of admission.

Give Spitfire a listen.

TELEVISION

Earlier this year we viewed the pilot for a possible new TV series based on Bill Manhoff's hit broadway play **Owl and the Pussycat** and found it to be one of the brighter prospects for the 1976 fall season. Unfortunately, what with networks and sponsors the way they are . . . the story concerns a disenchanted prostitute who sets up housekeeping with a suicidal writer . . **Owl** never quite made it on the Autumn Agenda. And a shame, too.



In the pilot, dumb Doris was played to the hilt by Bernadette Peters who in that one thirty minute episode, managed to bring more credibility to the role than Barbara Streisand mustered in her two hour movie version. We were totally spellbound.

Peters is a flawless comedienne. Norman Lear recognized this and wisely assigned her to his latest fall concoction, **All's Fair**. He even coupled her talents with those of the charismatic Richard Crenna. But this is where his genius ended. He stuck these two fine stars in a "battle of the sexes" genre that's as pitifully dated as it is weak and contrived.

He is a nationally known columnist with a very conservative point of view. *She* is a free-thinking photographer whose liberal ideas spew forth with all the vigor and regularity of a Yellowstone geyser. They butt heads. They toss out insults. She accuses him of being unemotional and cool. He accuses her of being bad mannered and immature. (You see, there's about twenty years difference in their ages) And at the end of the first episode, where they predictably fall in love, each one is determined to "change" the other's point of view.

As in most of Lear's developments, All's Fair is just a bit *too* staged. At times the performers hold for laughs that don't quite sustain the warranted pauses. And he continually batters us with token blacks (this show is no exception), whether a part calls for one or not.

But we strongly suspect that All's Fair will make it. Most of Lear's vehicles have that same smell of success that seems to transcend poor direction and scripting. Peters is her usual raspy, energetic self, with Crenna sufficiently calm and sexy enough to carry off the stalest of roles. Still, we would have been happier seeing her do Owl and Crenna chancing his talents on a hunkier, if estranged Felix.
