



WEEKEND BEER BUST



Example: Mars always affects energy levels in the human body (the DNA in the genes). Jupiter movements spin off good fortune. This we know from years of observation.




ated. But alas, it was only Phoebe. With some dirt and some problems. Of which Phoebe always had an abundance of both. Especially the problems.




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shout "Thatago, Schwartz" through the window as Phoebe passed, his body gurgling toward the locker room.






was acquitted, he had been philosophically adopted by Vera, who sensed he needed a friend.



Gene reminds us of a southern aristocrat. Despite modish curls of salt and pepper hair, he somehow manages to retain that air of confederate nobility so seldom seen for real that one almost doubts its authenticity. Warm. A gentleman in the truest sense of the word.

Lynn, his lover/business partner, melts complacently into the background. A smile that never leaves his face suggests this as an act of habit rather than acquiesance.

It's Saturday afternoon. We sit in their living room and have coffee. We talk. We ask questions, some which are answered, some politely avoided.

Most Texans recognize the name and face of Gene Howell. He's been in the bar business for over ten years; has successfully run the most popular discos in the southwest. Few Houstonians don't remember and miss the Farm-

house, some of us (present company outlawed) even go back to the Old Cabaret days.

And to what does he attribute his success?

"It's a matter of liking people, I think. If you're standing at the door of a bar and you greet them. People can tell if its a fake smile."

When he's not involved in the business, what bar(s) does he frequent?

"I don't like to go to the bars. I just like to run them."

Simple? Simple. Gene feels that the reason most Houstonians miss the Farmhouse is due to this lack of managerial friendliness.

"No one knows who owns the disco bars anymore. Or who runs them. There's a personal touch lacking."

And show bars. What about them?

"Well, I think it's a mistake to mix a show bar with a disco unless they're in two separate areas . . . like we did with the Farmhouse. You're alienating a lot of people by doing that."

But it seems to work in Dallas.

"Houstonians don't go in for drags like Dallas people. Houston is more of a disco city."

So what about now. Any irons in

the fire?

"Well, we own two houses in the southwest part of Houston that we rent out. And I still own that dance bar in Huntsville, The Sound Machine."

Is it gay?

Gene laughs. "Lord, no. I wish it

were. But in Huntsville?"

We speak of the old Farmhouse days. The bar, it seems, did not close for the reason most people think. But he tosses off the subject, it obviously doesn't hold much importance to him. We ask if he plans to open a bar in the near future. His hazel eyes twinkle.

"We're always looking. But finding the right building is the main prob-


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

REVIEWS

Theatre

Fortune and Men's Eyes opened last Friday night at Houston's Contempory Dance Theatre and is slated to run weekends (Friday, Saturday, and Sunday evenings) through October. We attended the press preview last Thursday and are happy to report on a tight, well-constructed show which left us both emotionally drained and theatrically satisfied. We weren't totally impressed with some of its cast, but director Bruce Bowen structured his production so as to transcend these weak characters and get at the real meat of the play. (No pun intended - there's frontal nudity, even a simulated rape scene which has its participants moaning and groaning to a "stagey" climax) And the meat to which we refer is nicely summated in the first and last two lines of the sonnet:

"When, in disgrace with fortune

and men's eyes,

I all alone beweep my outcast state. For thy sweet love remember'd such wealth brings

That then I scorn to change my

state with kings."

But the dialogue in Fortune is painfully dated. Jargon words such as "jerk," "crap," and "joint" are tossed pointlessly about by four young actors who portray hardened prison cellmates but more remind us of freshmen in a college fraternity house. They have a scrubbed look, and sometimes this antiquated patter comes off sounding a bit silly. This is not meant to slight their acting abilities, however, some of them were quite good. Kim Keithley, as Ian-Mona, was excellent. Doug Holmes, as Queeie, had many nice moments ("Let me in this cell right now! Open this door!"), but his character developed only moderately and at times became too melodramatic. Chris Mountain portrayed the heavy of the piece, a role predictably dubbed Rocky, and did it with some style. But he didn't seem as comfortable as some of the other actors. It's as if he doubted his own abilities to carry off the part. Thomas C. Carrol, as the older wiser guard, was delightful. Unfortunately, though, it was the leading character (that of Smitty) who fell apart under the impish manner of lames Norris. Had Bowen's direction been any less precise, the show could have likewise fallen apart due to Norris's unpracticed emoting. But it didn't.

Fortune and Men's Eyes is so cleverly staged that we could easily sit through it again. (And we just as easily

might.)


