
MOTORCYCLES ON BROADWAY?



Houston's popular new Northside bar is the NOW OR NEVER pictured here on Halloween











THAT MOTOWN SOUND!

The last half of the sixties: The Motown machine in Detroit is churning out an unprecedented stream of hits. "Where Did Our Love Go," "Baby Love," and "I Hear A Symphony." "Reach Out, I'll Be There," and "It's The Same Old Song."

All those records were written and produced by the same 3-man team: Holland–Dozier–Holland. The Holland brothers, Brian and Eddie, and Lamont Dozier also recorded Martha and the Vandellas, Marvin Gaye, and the Miracles. But in 1968, the H-D-H trio broke away from Motown with bad feelings on both sides. They set up their own label, Invictus, and had hits with Freda Payne and The Chairman of the Board.

As for the "Reach Out" and "Baby Love" artists...the Four Tops left Motown years ago, with unsettled lawsuits behind them. They've since recorded for ABC, but never with the same success. The Supremes, of course, were never the same after the departure of Diana Ross, but she, and they, have stayed with Motown.

Martha Reeves, The Jackson 5 and others have not. As Motown ventured into moviemaking, their influence on rhythm and blues lessened.

"Motown" isn't in Detroit anymore. It's on Sunset Boulevard in Hollywood. It's a sprawling combination of offices and studios and it turns out a steady stream of products. The Temptations release albums every few months—the most recent produced by themselves. Junior Walker and The Miracles are still with Motown too; but the hits are fewer and further between.

While it was radio that helped make Motown in the sixties, it's disco that may give it new life for the last half of the seventies. The success of "Love Hangover" has spurred emphasis on the development of new Motown talent-much of it discooriented, and their service to clubs is excellent. The Miracles' "Down to Love Town" seems like one step toward a comeback for the "Motown Sound."


"Gas masks, combat boots, a canteen? Army fatiques! Where'd you get all this stuff?"

"And she agreed?" Burt asked. "Not right off. But after I pulled her out from under the bed, it was easier to convince her. I think the sunlight was hurting her eyes."



Telekinesis (or the power of thought to move inanimate objects) is the subject for Brian De Palma's goredrenched *Carrie*, playing multiples statewide through December. It's based on a "factual" novel by Stephen King and sloppily adapted to the screen by Lawrence D. Cohen who manages, in his taste for blood and guts specifics, to evade the mystery (not to mention sensitivity) of King's original story.

Carrie White is a withdrawn high school student who is tormented by fellow classmates when she begins menstruation during gym class one day. The girls laugh at her, back her into the shower, and begin stoning her with tampons, sanitary napkins, and paper towels. She screams and cries for help. And to the rescue comes the pretty and with-it Miss Collins (P.E. coach) who whisks her away to the principal's office for some serious counseling. It seems that Carrie's mother has sheltered the teenager so severely that female problems are as alien to her as good taste is to producer Paul Monash. She's promptly sent home where religiously fanatic mom slaps her around for committing the "sin of blood" and then drags her screaming through the house and locks her in a dungeonish closet to pray for her sins. (We begin to suspect this is a nightly routine as Carrie becomes more and more withdrawn and self-pitying.)

But Carrie, like most disturbed teenagers, has a lot of uncontrolled metaphysical power which surfaces from time to time in bursts of psychic energy and randomly hurls things through the air, breaks things, and moves things. And so Carrie, sullen and rejected by all, turns to the


library to further alienate herself from reality and to reading books to further develop these hidden powers. And does she ever!

Revenge is sweet, and this psychic lass gets her fair share with interest as she becomes the target for a horrendous practical joke during the high school prom and in retaliation releases more power in that one evening than bloodshot little Reagan ever *dreamed* of in her totally possessed state.

Well that's the plot, folks. A movie to miss, right? Not necessarily. Although Producer Monash obviously released his film as a low-budget money-making *Omen/Exorcist* spinoff, Director Brian De Palma struggled valiantly to give *Carrie* an artistic look and somehow even managed to transcend Cohen's generally weak script.

The cast, all things considered, is rather good. Sissy Spacek, as Carrie, has a hauntingly wistful demeanor that makes for good screen appeal. Piper Laurie, as Carrie's eccentric mom, emotes amazingly well and has the healthy, youthful glow usually associated with someone so deeply disturbed. Betty Buckley, as the understanding Miss Collins, is pretty enough to hypnotize her way through a thankless role. And there's even a surprise appearance by John Travolta (of Welcome Back, Kotter fame) that proves refreshing if not totally disconnected from his TV character.

Carrie will probably not frighten you. Or for that matter will it even enlighten you. But there's a good chance it will entertain you, as it did us. And we're always more impressed by low-budget films creatively directed than overproduced ones with little or no imagination shown behind them. by **Tom Goreman**

A LOOK AT THE METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY CHURCHES

It all began in 1968 when a gay brother in a southern California jail told his visiting friend, Troy Perry, that God did not love gay people.

Perry's determination to prove otherwise has resulted in the foundation and growth of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches.

The Fellowship now has member churches, missions, and study groups in every major city, and in many smaller cities and communities in the U.S., with churches in Britain, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and Africa. The Fellowship is one of the fastest growing Christian denominations in the world.

By providing a supportive and loving atmosphere for its membership and encouragement to gay Christians in other denominations, UFMCC has become a major force in changing religious attitudes about gay people.

Ten years ago, the only position the various denominations expressed on the topic of homosexuals was that we were grave sinners deserving their condemnation and sympathetic intolerance. Today, almost every American denomination has either an internal gay organization or some form of study commission considering theological plans for the graceful acceptance of gay membership.

For believers UFMCC has provided a religious haven and the base for reform in traditional denominations; for non-believers UFMCC has provided an alternative theology to the Bible beating all gay people used to receive.

TWIT country has four MCC groups: MCC Dallas is the oldest and largest and has recently moved into new and impressive facilities; Agape MCC in Ft. Worth and MCC of the Living Spirit in the Arlington/ Grand Prairie area give good coverage to the Dallas/ Ft. Worth metroplex; MCC of The Reserrection in Houston and a new study group in Austin show the trend toward growing outreach of the denomination.

Metropolitan Community Churches are first and foremost churches and their primary function is to provide spiritual guidence and support to the believers who come there, but their outreach and function include more than that. The Fellowship takes the widest view of Christian responsibility and addresses itself to the relief of human suffering and support of human dignity wherever its churches are found.

MCC's are not activist organizations but neither do they turn aside when brothers and sisters suffer discrimination and abuse. The ministers and members of UFMCC are frequently in the front lines of the battles to improve the social and political position of gay people. Yet most of the membership of any local church can attend services to worship and pray without being dragged out of the closet to get involved in the activities of reform conducted by those who choose to help the effort.

The church phone is an important connection to the gay community. The callers can find knowledgable counselors for their personal or relationship problems. The various churches can provide information to help overcome the religious objections to gay life styles that may result in an improved relationship between a gay person and his/her parents. Church staffs are frequently called on to provide speakers for improved public understanding of gay people or just to be there when a brother or sister needs someone to talk to.

MCC membership is composed of persons from every religious back-

ground. An atmosphere of acceptance and tolerance is absolutely necessary so that our Pentecostal brothers and sisters can worship and pray side by side with our Roman Catholic sisters and brothers. Many MCC members are non-gays who seek the spiritual rewards of loving acceptance for all who come. The MCC altar is one of the few places where gay and non-gay male and female people of various races, nationalities, and social stations can meet with dignity as loving, sharing, trusting equals. -RAY HILL




